

**Carnival** is a feast celebrated all over the planet. In the

Christian calendar, the carnival takes place before Lent, a period of abstinence during which believers have to dedicate themselves fully to cultivating their



spirituality. They also cannot eat meat because it was considered sinful, hence the name: the word carnival comes from the Latin "carnem levare", which means "remove meat".

In the carnival, to maintain anonymity and not be recognized amid the revelry and bustle, people covered their faces with masks and dressed in costumes.

Every year carnival falls on a different

date. There is a close relationship with Easter, although carnival is a pagan festival. A few centuries ago, it was agreed that Holy Week would have a previous period of 40 days (Lent) in which it is mandatory to perform acts of sacrifice and penance, including fasting and abstinence. This period begins on Ash Wednesday, so this is the deadline to be able to eat and drink anything and everything, have fun and party.

If we want to know when the carnival is going to be, we simply have to know on what date the first full moon occurs after the beginning of spring. Find the first Sunday and count backwards 47 days on the calendar.

This year, 2023, the carnival begins on Thursday, February 16th, ending on Wednesday, February 22nd, 2023, the day on which Ash Wednesday is also celebrated and Lent begins.

As is we all know, the carnivals of Rio in Brazil, Venice, Tenerife and many other places in the world are really spectacular, but we have one much closer and no less important:





Platja d'Aro celebrates its 45th Anniversary this year

From the 1 1th to the 22nd February , Platja d'Aro and Castell d'Aro decorate their streets for the various activities they have prepared among which the Gran Rúa de Carrozas y Comparsas stands out.



There are also musical parades, children's parades, presentation of the King and Queen of the carnival, Rúa in Castell d'Aro .... On February 1 6th the traditional celebration of "Fat Thursday"(I). It all ends on Wednesday February the 22nd with the well-known and inevitable "Burial of the Sardine" (2). All events and celebrations are open to the public.

 "Fat Thursday": In Catalonia it is above all a family and popular festival. On this day, called "dijous gras", it is traditional to eat butifarras (sausages), of which the carnival sausage itself is the egg one, as well as butifarra omelette and "coca de llardons" (cracklings).

(2) "Burial of the Sardine": It is defined as the last activity that remains each year of the carnival, a tradition full of irony that commemorates the end of the carnival and the beginning of Catholic Lent. Undoubtedly, one of the most mythical moments of each year that features a sardine burial and people in mourning with a great touch of ironic smoke. The burial of the sardine is an ancient tradition that is celebrated in Spain and some Latin American countries.
