SANT JORDI DAY

Have you ever had the impression that half of Catalan men are called JORDI? Probably because the patron saint of Catalonia is Sant Jordi. He is celebrated every April 23rd, and this is one of the most popular festivals in the region, which combines the lovers' festival (Valentine's Day is much less popular) and the book festival. The story of Sant Jordi was born from a legend including these 4 elements: an evil dragon, a pretty princess, a valiant knight and a red rose.



It is said that in a small village near Tarragona, a horrible dragon settled in a cave terrorized the inhabitants. They decided to draw short straw the person who would go and confront the terrible dragon in the hope of killing it and thus freeing the village. Unfortunately, the merciless dragon devoured the inhabitants one after the other. When the Princess's turn came, she bravely (or maybe not) headed towards the cave and, just as the fierce dragon was about to devour her, a handsome young knight on horseback just happened to be passing by... You have of course guessed that it was the brave Sant Jordi who, with no hesitation, pierced the vicious dragon with his sword. At the place where the blood of the dragon flowed, a red rose bush appeared from which Sant Jordi offered a magnificent rose to the Princess.



But there's no book in this legend... Well, in the 1920s Barcelona was a major center for book publishing, so in 1929 a well-inspired man* proposed that Sant Jordi's Day would also be the Catalan Book Day as both Cervantes and Shakespeare died on April 23rd, 1616. *Well-inspired because on that single day, EUR 20 million are spent on books in Catalonia.

This is the reason why, in Catalonia every April 23rd, men (who identify with brave Sant Jordi) offer a rose to their beloved and women offer a book to their gentleman. Of course,

today the custom has adapted to society and women also have the right to cultivate themselves and can therefore receive a rose AND a book. And modern couples are no longer just a beautiful princess and a valiant knight.

So, get ready for April 23rd, and don't miss the celebrations all over Catalonia. Most towns turn into open-air bookstores and red roses decorate the streets, balconies, store windows... Some restaurants even propose candlelight dinners.

With a curious smile, he told me I could buy a new shirt at the hospital bar. Although doubtful, I went immediately to the hospital bar and asked the bartender if it was true he sold shirts. His eyes went wide and after hesitating, replied, "yes, I do."

During my transaction with the bartender I noticed that the customers at the bar kept looking at me. I quickly left the bar for my room to change into my fresh shirt. Sporting my new shirt, I went to the hospital living room to show it to my new friends. They were all there and when I appeared they all started laughing. They took a long time to stop. I asked my friend, the one who told me where to buy a shirt, what was so funny.
